

In Guatemala City there is a walk dedicated to local art and culture. It is the famous museum street a place that gives rise to many events with guided tours and very curious spaces.

Museum Street is located on the 5th street of Zone 13 in the Capital City and is confirmed by the following museums:

National Museum of Natural History Jorge Ibarra:



This museum was founded on July 4, 1950 by Professor Jorge A. Ibarra. It has 10 exhibition halls with spaces dedicated to the origin of the universe, a fern garden, temporary exhibitions and much more.

A very curious fact about this space is that it was one of the first museums to exist and its first headquarters

was in the tea room of the La Aurora Zoological Park.









National Museum of Modern Art:



This site was originally called the National Museum of History and Fine Arts, it was created on January 15, 1935. Something curious about this museum is that it initially occupied the Temple of Calvary.

This site is known for its impressive works of art in which the famous mural known as the

glorification of the quetzal stands out.

Opening hours of the National Museum of Modern Art: they open their doors from Tuesday to Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. In addition, on weekends they open from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. to 12:00 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. The admission price is: Q 5.00 nationals, Q 50.00 foreigners and students enter free.









National Museum of Archaeology:



This is a space dedicated to the conservation, research and dissemination of archaeological and ethnological assets, belonging to the Cultural Heritage of the Nation of Guatemala. It is an ideal destination to learn about Guatemalan

culture with personalized tours. The museum is currently closed due to renovations.
